## From the Rotalight Achives

## **The Ideal of Service**

As a comparatively new member of a relatively "old" club, nothing said here is designed as "preaching," for that would be presumption. A vast majority of "our team" is far wiser and experienced in Rotary than the writer. Rather what is said is intended for the writer himself and merely put on paper so that others may read the memo. During this year, I hope to practice the ideal of service as the basis of worthy enterprise. That is the simple and fundamental object of Rotary, and I shall seek to attain it.

That is a challenging paragraph and is right in line with Rotary's ideal of service. Many members of this club can truthfully say that it is their creed, for the list of civic endeavors engaged in, and led, by Rotarians is impressive.

President Christopher Bethel in his everso dashingly debonair manner deftly clanged our Club bell at approximately 12:14 pm calling the best Rotary Club in District 6900 to order. President Chris extended aspirational affirmations hoping that Thanksgiving happiness was had by all. He then called upon one of our distinguished birthday Rotarians, Judge Adele Grubbs, to offer our invocation. support this good event, namely: 'Family Shopping Day' at the 'Walmarts', 12/8, 1 pm until 3 pm, our 'Toiletry Bag Assembly' opportunity of happiness, 12/10, 5:30 pm 877 Franklin Gateway - Suite 300, and YES(!), be present on Friday, December 13th, 2019, at 877 Franklin Gateway, Suite 700, at 5:30 pm to support this wonderful service project event. Deborah Marshall was recognized to commend that bell ringers are still needed for our late Saturday afternoon "Red Kettle" Salvation Army service project at the Sam's Club, 150 Cobb Parkway. Methinks the Georgia Bulldog-LSU 'Tigger' SEC game at the ATL Mercedes Dome that commences at 4 pm has jeopardized the enlistment of Rotarians for the late day service slots. Our President then called once again upon Salvation Army enlistee Deborah Marshall to introduce our esteemed guest, Lieutenant Jose Valentin, who is area leader for the Cobb/Douglas Counties Salvation Army Corp. His program for our meeting, "Today's Salvation Army."

After a brief explanation of his previous career track (formerly a police officer for 17 years and business entrepreneur), Lt. Valentin explained that each day throughout Metro Atlanta, The Salvation Army Centers provide emergency and life-sustaining assistance with food, clothing, rent/mortgage, utilities, school supplies and furniture to individuals and families facing these crises. Likewise, Lt. Valentin expounded on helping the growing number homeless people in our area and around the ATL by providing not only "an encouraging word, but showers, laundry facilities, 'comfort kits' and food bags." "This program," he noted, "is there for those who would otherwise not have access to these basic needs"; "but we also hope to impact their lives in a positive and Christ centered manner." The Salvation Army has an on-going ever-expanding vision of "meeting the needs of those in our community by providing a safe and caring environment to meet some of their immediate needs." "We also strive to provide opportunities to help empower these individuals to move forward with their lives both physically and spiritually." Lt. Valentin also gave pertinent and keen insight into the history of the Salvation Army that was founded in London, England in 1865, by William Booth. He additionally gave impressive statistics related to the number of homeless people, meals, showers, afterschool children, summer campers, and "vacation Bible school" enrollees served over the past year. Moreover, he stated that "eighty-two cents of every dollar given goes directly to the mission work of the Salvation Army." Impressive! Furthermore, Lt. Valentin gave historical insight into the 'red kettle' bell-ringing tradition that got its start in San Francisco in 1891. Salvation Army Captain Joseph McFee was exceptionally distraught because so many poor individuals in San Francisco were going hungry. During the holiday season, he resolved to provide a free Christmas dinner for the destitute and poverty-stricken. He only had one major hurdle to overcome -- funding the project. As he pondered the challenge of feeding over 1,000 homeless people, his remembered his sailor days in Liverpool, England. He recollected how at 'Stage Landing' dock, where the boats came in, there was a large, iron kettle

called "Simpson's Pot" into which passers-by tossed a coin or two to help the poor. The next day Captain McFee placed a similar pot at the Oakland Ferry Landing at the foot of Market Street. Beside the pot, he placed a sign that read, "Keep the Pot Boiling." He soon had the money to see that the needy people were fed well at Christmastime. Now, we know the "rest of the story!"



A few questions were presented as customary from the floor. Rotarian barrister Joe Atkins directed a question about the dramatic influx of homeless people in our area. Lt. Valentin did acquiesce that indeed homelessness is on the rise, hence, all the more reason to generously support the "Army"! President Chris then made remarks about our funding for the Salvation Army due to the exceptional work of Deborah Marshall and Michelle Miller, recently and in days past, enabling a benevolent gift from of Club in the amount of \$2500! A symbolic "BIG CHECK" was then appropriately presented to Lt. Valentin. Our President then noted that a book would be presented to a Marietta Elementary School in our guest speaker's honor. Rotarians Walt Walker and Tom Downs presided over our Club's 'Opportunity Drawing' and once again Lady Luck would not dance with nary a Rotarian the 'cha-cha' of gleeful good fortune. Chris Mitchell nor Salvation Army Band member, Josh, picked the everso elusively enigmatic red oblong-like marble!

Our noteworthy practice of respectful, rousing recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag then occurred, followed by our weekly equally enthusiastic recitation of the Rotary International "Four Way Test" of the "Things We Think, Say, and Do" were both well led by the delightfully dear-to-all, faithful Rotarian **Becky Sawyer**. And thereafter we were all once again "belled" adjourned after yet another marvelously managed Rotary Club of Marietta Wednesday mid-week meeting during our 100th year of making an exceptional difference in our community, district, and world... "It's a great day to be a Rotarian!"
